For this cooking activity, parents could be supporting the children to create their own Autumn themed biscuits.

This recipe will create approximately 24 biscuits.

What you will need:

- 200g unsalted butter at room temperature
- 200g golden caster sugar
- 1 large egg
- ½ tsp vanilla extract
- 400g plain flour
- Mixing bowl
- Baking tray
- Baking parchment

Introduce the activity to the children by looking up at the sky and trying to find a plane. If you do see one, talk about the where they think the plane is going.



Open a discussion about any holidays you may have been on or where the children would like to go. Let's pack a suitcase for the holiday.

Give the children a small empty suitcase and ask the children what they think that they might need for their holiday. Remind them of things that they may have forgotten: toothbrush, clothes,

Together, imitate the sounds using clapping and vocal noises.




Next, carefully make snippets approximately 2cm long, on one side of the tube. Bend the cardboard strips outward. Demonstrate to the children how to dip

Indoor bowling

Today's challenge is all about counting.
Parents will create an indoor bowling experience for the children. When the pins get knocked over, support the children to count how many fell.

What you will need:

- 6 empty
 bottles/
 cartoon/
 cardboard tubes
 (preferably the
 same size)
- Uncooked rice
- Small ball

Activity:

- Food colour in orange, yellow and red

What you will need to do

- 1- Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6 and line a baking sheet with baking parchment.
- 2- Put the butter in a bowl and beat it with electric beaters until soft and creamy.
- 3- Beat in the sugar, then the egg and vanilla, and finally the flour to make a dough. If the dough feels a bit sticky, add a little bit more flour and knead it in.
- 4- Separate the dough and fold in some orange, yellow or red food colour.
- 5- Pull pieces off the dough and roll them out to about the thickness of two £1 coins on a floured surface. The easiest way to do this with small children is to roll the mixture out on a baking mat. Cut out leaf shapes

Begin by filling the empty container with rice. Fill the bottles a quarter of the way. This will help to keep the bottles steady. The rice will also give the bottles some weight and encourage the children to put more force into rolling the ball.

Next. line up the bottles in a triangle formation. Take a few steps back and demonstrate to the children how to roll the ball.

Support and encourage the children to take a few steps back and roll the ball. Remember the children should be using an under arm roll.

When the bottles fall over, support the children by counting together, to count the bottles that have fallen over.

- using a biscuit cutter or an adult using a knife.
- 6- Peel away the leftover dough around the edges. Re-roll off-cuts and repeat.
- 7- Transfer the individual biscuits to the baking sheet and bake for 8-10 minutes or until the edges are just brown. Leave to cool for 5 minutes. then enjoy.

For this activity parents can support the children to find numbers around their environment. This can be indoors or outdoors.

Begin the lesson by looking at numbers 0 to 5. Look around the room and point out two numbers that you can see. Ask the children to look around and help you find some more numbers. Support the children to recognise the numbers and say the numbers too.

See if the children can count out objects for each number that they find. For example; if they find a number 3 on the wall, count 3 fingers or count 3 blocks.


