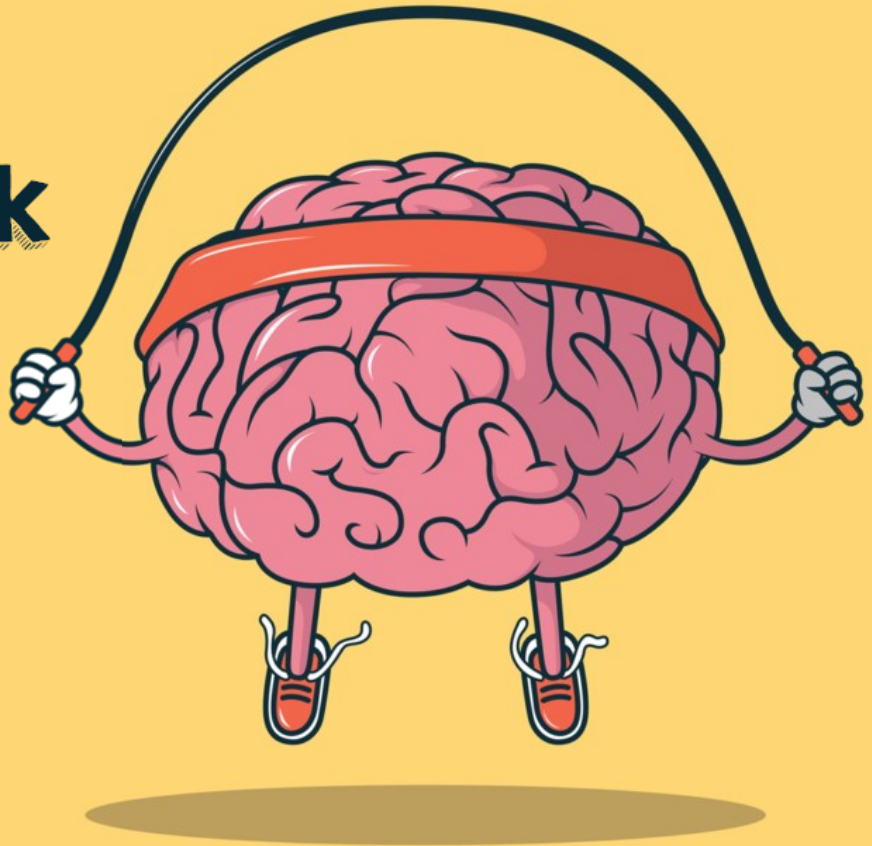

Literacy - Creative Writing

This week the children will be learning to write informal letters to a family member they have not seen during the Covid-19 lockdown. They will discover the format of letter writing and discover the kind of language needed to share news and emotion through letter writing. At home you could use the Purple Mash platform and help your child write their first ever email in a safe and secure digital environment.

Maths

This week in Maths the children will continue to look at TIME. They will consolidate their knowledge of o'clock, half past, quarter to and quarter past. They will utilise their knowledge to work through worded problems focusing on durations of time that include reading bus and train timetables. At home you could help your child plot out a timetable of their weekend showing the durations of time spent on their daily activities.

Project

In Project this week, the children will investigate the Japanese town of Kamikatsu. This small town produces zero waste! They will understand the importance of waste and the impact this has on our environment and the world. The children will discover how Kamikatsu town is able to produce zero waste and will record their findings in an information report. At home, the children can try out their findings to see if their home can become waste free!

PSHEE—Gender Equality

This week the children will continue to look at the term GENDER EQUALITY. They will discover the meaning and take part in numerous activities that will help them understand the importance of the gender equality in today's society. We will explore gender stereotypes and the different roles men and women can play. The children will look at gender stereotypes within literature such as nursery rhymes, fairy tales and stories and we will challenge 'traditional' views of the roles of girls and boys within these texts. At home you could discuss Gender Equality with your child and hear what they believe is possible for themselves in today's ever-changing world.
